The church's food pantry continues to operate twice a week: Wednesdays from 10am to noon and Sundays from 2pm to 3:30. Without our fabulous volunteers, both from within our congregation and from the community, this would not be possible. We are now serving between 200 and 250 households each week and the many ways our congregation contributes is greatly appreciated. Thank you for supporting this valuable resource for our neighbors in need.

We are now only distributing household items on the first Wednesday and Sunday of the month. We are fortunate to receive diapers at no cost through the Orange County Food Bank, but most items we distribute require someone to shop. If you are ever at the Dollar Tree or are willing to make a special trip, please consider purchasing a few items to donate. The most requested items are bleach, laundry detergent, baby wipes and dish soap (pictured to the left). They are \$1.25 each at the Dollar Tree. We also need Tuna and crackers (also pictured to the left) for the food bags we give those who don't have a kitchen to prepare food.

We continue to collect the thick, reusable grocery bags, so if you have any, please bring them on Sunday or drop them by the church office. Thank you! **Pam on behalf of the Mission Committee**

Pastor's Remarks - by R. Winston Presnall

Dear Eaves-droppers,

How do you get your news?

In my home the television predominantly runs news shows. Occasionally, the Outdoor Network channel interrupts the political babble. I'm a sucker for a deer or elk hunt especially in Montana and New Mexico. Mostly, I like headline news when I am in a hurry to catch up. Headline news is snippets— a piece here and there, and oft repeated within the hour. I like some of the news that I get in those hour long commentary shows, but it becomes argumentative and so-and-so won't shut up.



How do you get your news?

As a child, my mom said she found the news of our "comings and goings" simply by overhearing us. I guess we spilled our agendas in side-bar conversations moving in and out of our bedrooms. Mom overheard this and that. I overhear this and that in my office as conversation flows down the halls within ear shot or the TV is loud enough downstairs. Amazing what news I can overhear. The trouble with overhearing is that I don't hear all of it.

> When we over-hear the news it is usually a comment associated with the news. "She was putting dishes in the cupboard." ("Did so and so fall in her home?") I keep listening. I listen more closely. "Her son found her." ("Goodness, is she alright?") I am anxious to hear more, get my questions answered. "Did she break a bone?" "Where is she now?"

You and I would admit that overhearing isn't the best way to get the news. How many times has your anxiety raised when a sentence begins: "I overheard so-and-so saying..." The Session and its committees always want to stay ahead

of news that is only overheard or third-hand. "Here is our report." "This update will catch you up." "A town hall meeting is now scheduled." Melissa makes sure we get a weekly ePress. These are the best ways to give and receive news, actually.

Which brings me to the annual reports! Our Annual Meeting is February 25 following Worship. We'll get the news of all the work completed and begun in the last year. We may even whet our appetites for even more this year. We will be reminded that we are newscasters who report what we've done with the gifts from God, shared with each other. Ministry! Church!

How do you get your news? I hope you will get THE news by being part of the community at our Annual Meeting and listening to those who share their lives in service at our church.

Health Ministry: Have A Heart



February is Heart Month. Heart Disease is the number one killer in the United States. This year the American Heart Association just celebrated its 100th anniversary and has a website that you might find interesting. It is http://www.heart.org/HEARTORG. This site has many interesting features such as Life's Essential 8, which describes two areas of healthy living – behaviors and health factors. The topic for this article is Symptoms of Heat Attacks and Strokes. There are four symptoms of a Heart Attack 1) Chest Discomfort – most occur in the center of the chest and last more than a few minutes. 2) Discomfort in other areas of the upper body – one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw, or stomach. 3) Shortness of breath – with or without chest discomfort. 4) Other signs

may include breaking out in a cold sweat, nausea, or lightheadedness, chest discomfort, discomfort in other areas of the upper body, and shortness of breath. For Stroke remember FAST. FAST stands for 1) Face drooping or numbness on one side (Ask the person to smile.) 2) Arm weakness – (Ask the person to raise both arms and see if one arm drifts downward.)
3) Speech difficulty – (Does the person have slurred speech, is unable to talk, or is difficult to understand?) and 4) Time to call 911 if any one of these symptoms is present.

Flavors Around the Morld: Brazil - Brizadeiros

The past few months have been pretty busy for this traveler, but it's finally time to fuel up the plane and pack our bags! Let's take a trip to a warm country to get a break from the cold weather, Brazil! With Valentine's Day coming up, we are going to try out a dessert for your special sweetie. Brigadeiros are Brazilian fudge rolled into balls and covered in sprinkles. They are a favorite dessert among Brazilians because of its history and rich taste. To Brazilians, it isn't a party unless it has a good supply of brigadeiros. It is also an extremely versatile recipe. Don't want to wait until its cool to form the fudge into balls? Well it is also commonly eaten with a spoon or on top of ice cream. Is the chocolate too rich? That's okay, you can swap out a couple ingredients and make strawberry, coconut, patriotic , or even beer brigadeiros (you can find many varieties brigadeiro recipes online with a quick Google search). Time to learn a few things about Brazil!

This lively and beautiful country is famous for its hospitality, Carnivals, and the Amazon. It is the fifth largest country in the world and consists of tropics, mountains, coastlines, grasslands, forests, and islands. Most of the country's population resides in the southeastern region in its famous areas like Rio de Janeiro and Sao Paulo. During Carnival of Brazil, their population bursts with millions of tourists. In 2019, Rio de Janeiro alone was visited by 1.7 million visitors. Carnival starts on the Friday before Ash Wednesday as a celebration marking the beginning of Lent. There is no such thing as "too much" for those in attendance - giant parade floats, dancers everywhere in opulent costumes, musicians in every direction, roads packed with people shoulder-to-shoulder both day and night. The Amazon rainforest is another Brazilian attraction that is famous across the globe. Though, it is not known for its population of people but its population of wildlife and vegetation. Within its vast expanse of around 2.3 million square miles of rainforest (60% is in Brazil) are 40,000 plant species, 2,500 fish species, 1,300 bird species, 430 mammals, and 2.5 million insect species. It is also home to 400 - 500 indigenous tribes. The various plants produce 20% of the world's oxygen. The Amazon River does not disappoint in size or volume either. It spans 2,000 miles and is the largest river by the volume of its discharge rate, a whopping 7.381 million square feet per second! It supplies 20% of the water than runs into the ocean. This rainforest is at serious risk, however. Due mainly to cattle ranchers tearing down trees to make farms for their livestock, 20% of the rainforest has been lost to deforestation. That is 20% of the entire world's oxygen being completely eliminated by 2100. Takes your breath away doesn't it?

So how did Brazil come to be such a complex and diversified country? Just take a look at its history. Before Brazil was founded in 1500 by Portuguese commander Pedro Alvares, it was home to around 30 million indigenous people who lived mostly by the coastline and river banks for around 11,000 years or more. At the time of founding, there were hundreds of tribes who constantly fought with one another. They did not see themselves as one people. So, when Pedro came and offered a few of the Brazilian tribes a trade - help with fighting other tribes for some lucrative red brazilwood trees - they took the offer. Trees were bountiful across the land, after all. For centuries after, Brazilians had to deal with the loose and convoluted authority of the Portuguese. Instead of a centralized government, nobles were given parts of Brazil and were told to rule and occupy it themselves. Meanwhile, Brazil was being stripped of its natural resources such as wood, gold, precious jewels, etc. by Portugal and other foreign countries. Immigrants started pouring in to take advantage of the free-for-all on resources and for other reasons, as well. Slaves were ripped from their homes and millions of Africans were imported until slavery was abolished in 1888, which is around 14 years *after* our church was founded. Many Americans moved to Brazil after the abolishment of slavery in the U.S. to take advantage of it still being legal. Christians immigrated to the country to run away from the Ottoman empire. Even a Japanese and Brazilian immigration treaty brought so many Japanese immigrants, that Brazil has the 2nd largest population of Japanese people. You can definitely see how diversity is so central to Brazilian culture. More on Brazil at a another time, I am really craving some sweets!



Brigadeiros

Prep Time: 15 mins • Cook Time: 10 mins • Total Time: 25 mins

Ingredients:

- 1 (14 Ounce) Can Sweetened Condensed Milk
- 3 Tablespoons Unsweetened Cocoa Directions:
- Gather all ingredients.
- Combine condensed milk, cocoa, and butter in a medium saucepan over medium heat. Cook and stir until the fudge appears to come loose from the pan, then cook while stirring for 2 more minutes. Remove from the heat and let rest until it is room temperature.
- Use your hands to shape into small balls and place on a serving plate. Can be eaten at once or chilled until serving.

- 1 Tablespoon Butter
- Sprinkles or Nuts

Notes to Income: Offerings for the year ended up almost \$8,000 higher than expectations. Another strong showing in Investment Income in December helped Other Income ended the year \$10,400+ above its target. Total transfers from GSC Proceeds needed to balance the 2023 budget came in \$30,000 less than anticipated.

Notes to Expense: A big shout out to everyone who help keep a cap on unnecessary spending. Your efforts resulted in a \$12,219 reduction in anticipated expenses for the year. Thank you.
